# **Board elections**

The School Board election to appoint five parent members for the next 3 year term will take place on Wednesday 7 September 2022. As for previous elections, we have appointed CES as our returning officer to manage the election process.

Board meetings are held twice a term (8 per year) and in addition board members sit on additional sub-committees relating to our property, faith and community.

Here are some of the things we do on the Board:

- work with the Principal and consult with staff, students and the community
- Set the education goals and strategic direction of the School

- Monitor progress and inform the School community on how the School is progressing against its annual targets and development of the students
- Decide how the School's funding will be spent
- Select the School's Principal and support the development of all staff
- Ensure the School is a physically and emotionally safe place for all students and staff and is inclusive of and caters for students with differing needs
- Oversee the management of staff, property, finances, curriculum and administration.

# Mid year results

Mid year assessments for all year levels show that the majority of our students are tracking within or above the expected curriculum level in Reading (95.4%) and Writing (88.7%). Of particular note was an impressive 96.6% of students working within or above their expected level in Maths at the mid year point compared with 90% this time last year. Mrs Penney and the staff have worked hard to implement the new Maths No Problem program since the start of this year and the Board feels this is a great indicator of the success of this program.

# School Planning

Thankyou for all your feedback on the strategic planning and future direction of the School. Key themes which emerged included:

- provision of high quality education
- support well-being
- embrace our Catholic faith and St Ignatius values
- create well-rounded learners
- have a strong sense of community.

The Board met last weekend for a planning session to create the new vision for the School over the next 3 years and we will share this with you next term once our new Board members have had an opportunity to add their input.

# Junior Playground

Thank you also for all your feedback on the suggested designs for the new junior playground - the Board spent a lot of time speaking with both families and the students to obtain their views. The strong favourite amongst the Year 1-3 children was Option B.

We have therefore obtained a revised concept design from Park Supplies & Playgrounds based on Option B with some changes to incorporate ideas from the feedback including:

- changes to the colour scheme
- addition of a shop front for imaginative play
- removal of equipment that might be too challenging for our younger learners or duplicates what we have on the senior playground
- reducing some of the 'plastic' elements.

You can see the revised design at the end of this BoardTalk. As noted previously the existing shade sail will remain and the surfacing will be artificial lawn.

The Friends and Family of St Ignatius will continue their fundraising in Terms 3 and 4 with the remaining funding to come from the Board. The Board intends to place the order for the playground shortly in order to enable our new playground to be installed early next year.

## **ERO**

This week Mrs Penney met with our dedicated ERO evaluation partner for the first time and gave him an introduction to our school. There will be further meetings over the next few months so that we can work together to create a School profile which will guide our evaluation goals.

# For your newsletters

The Education Review Office (ERO) has shifted to a new approach to evaluation that supports each school's improvement over time. Key features of the new approach, Te Ara Huarau, are that ERO will:

- → work with all schools in an ongoing way rather than as a one-off event
- → connect with each school's strategic planning and reporting cycle as part of their improvement journey
- work in partnership with schools, collaborating in support of equitable and excellent outcomes for all learners

As a result, each school will:

- → have a dedicated ERO Evaluation Partner who works alongside the school
- → have a different experience depending on needs, strengths, and their school's specific evaluation focus
- → be on a three-year evaluation cycle

### What will public reporting on ERO's website look like?

As schools' transition into the approach, ERO will work with schools to publish a one-off **Profile Report**. This will focus on the strategic goals schools have in place to improve learner outcomes and what the school is seeking to achieve through the evaluation.

Within a three year cycle all schools will then have a **Te Ara Huarau | School Evaluation Report**. This report includes information about the school's improvement journey, what the school has achieved for learners and their future priorities.

All schools will receive a **Board Assurance with Regulatory and Legislative Requirements Report** about their board's attestation to meeting those requirements. **Provision for International Students** and **Hostel Reports** will be published where applicable.

#### Other reporting

**Progress Reporting -** These reports are not published on ERO's website. They can be written by the school, jointly by the school and ERO or by ERO. Progress reporting provides specific information for specific audiences such as your board, the community, or the Ministry of Education.

## **Property**

A lot is happening around the School grounds over the July holidays.

You may have noticed that piles have been installed in the area next to our nature playground ready to receive our new 'shed' later this week (weather permitting). Once the shed is in place additional decking will be added in front of it to allow access from the classrooms and the play area. This building will be used to facilitate additional learning activities such as art, technology, woodwork etc. Funding for this project has come from the Friends & Family of St Ignatius, the Board and a generous legacy we received from a past pupil.

In addition, as previously mentioned in the last BoardTalk, installation of new boundary and astroturf fencing, an improved Hanene St entrance pathway and repairs to the asphalt to reduce water pooling will also be taking place during the holidays - made possible by government funding under the Essential Property Maintenance Programme. It is possible that these works may overrun into the start of next term so your patience during this time is much appreciated.

The Board also wants to thank one of our learning assistants, Nathalia Richardson for her work towards refreshing the Library. Nathalia came up with the idea to re-work the space with new painting, furnishings and a desk in order to make the area more inspiring and has put in a lot of time and effort to achieve this. Special thanks to Kitchen Mania who have offered to provide a new desk at no cost to us - that is brilliant! We hope the new look Library will start to take shape from next term.

Unfortunately we have not yet received notification from Auckland Transport as to when our new pedestrian crossing will be installed. Once we have further details we will let you know.

# Uniform

The Board have made some slight changes to the uniform policy prompted by Ministry of Education guidelines around ventilation which may mean more classroom windows and doors need to be left open during the winter months.

All children will now be permitted to wear their school jackets inside the classroom at the discretion of the teaching staff.

In addition we have amended the winter uniform guidelines so that our students may wear either a jersey or a cardigan regardless of their sex.
